## **Letter from the Director**



Dear Friends,

It is my pleasure to share our performance report for 2015. Although many people are still struggling in our community, AccessHealth Spartanburg and our partners continue to make a positive impact by both improving local health outcomes and reducing the costs of care to our community as a whole.

#### **Celebrating a Milestone**

October 1, 2015 marked AccessHealth Spartanburg's 5 year anniversary. In those 5 years, the program achieved dramatic results. More than 5,300 low-income, uninsured Spartanburg County residents were connected to a medical home. Every single patient was screened for Medicaid, Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program, Health Insurance Exchange and much more. In the last year alone, the percentage of patients who were able to obtain coverage and "graduate" from the AHS program grew from 10% to 18%. These are just a few examples of how our program is working for our community.

#### **Addressing Systemic Barriers**

AccessHealth Spartanburg uses a dual approach of providing connection to a primary medical home while also working to identify and address systemic, cultural and generational barriers to health and healthy lifestyle. Medical care is the first step in a long process of psychosocial assessment, followed by connection to behavioral health care, counseling, substance abuse treatment, specialty medical care, transportation to medical appointments, housing, vocational rehabilitation, continuing education, employment assistance, prescription assistance and much more.

AccessHealth Spartanburg is committed to forming unique community partnerships — programs and initiatives with Sherman Chiropractic College and the Spartanburg County Detention Center are just two such examples — testing new models of care, evaluating processes and measuring outcomes. The program maintains a laser-sharp focus on improving local health outcomes and lowering healthcare costs by leveraging existing community assets, building relationships, and prioritizing long-term comprehensive care.

#### An Eye on the Future

Though we have accomplished much, there is more to be done. We have learned that multi-stakeholder, multi-disciplinary collaboration is time-consuming and at times difficult, but there is no substitute for collective community action that generates resources, insight, and outcomes beyond what any one organization could achieve on its own. Our unofficial motto is, "Steal shamelessly and share relentlessly."

I invite you to read our Report to the Community for additional accomplishments and a snapshot of the health of our organization.

#### **Statistics**

An evaluation of hospital inpatient (IP) and emergency department (ED) utilization complied by the S.C. Office of Research and Statistics reports that AccessHealth network patients who used hospital services had less costly visits due to shorter inpatient lengths of stay and fewer admissions. AHS saved hospitals a combined \$3.6 million in 2015 alone.

Diagnosis-specific data showed additional positive impact from AHS.

Hypertension patients had a 68.18% reduction in admissions and a 70.88% reduction in costs.

Congestive Heart Failure patients had a 50% reduction in admissions and a 40.89% reduction in costs.

Asthma patients had a 70.83% reduction in admissions and a 74.45% reduction in costs.

Diabetes patients had a 42.11% reduction in admissions and a 34.73% reduction in costs.

# **Patient Profile AccessHealth: Halee Cordray**

Halee Cordray had never been uninsured before she moved to South Carolina in 2006. She found employment in South Carolina, but she was unable to obtain a job that offered health insurance. She was laid off in 2010. Shortly after being laid off, she visited a minor care center and was informed that she needed to see an ENT for a continuing health problem. The cost of that visit was expected to be over \$600. "Having just been laid off, I certainly did not have the funds to pay for the care that I needed." She began searching the internet for programs that would help with medical care. That is how she discovered AccessHealth Spartanburg.

After enrolling in AccessHealth, Cordray was diagnosed with Stage 3 Endometrial Cancer. Access-Health Spartanburg connected her with the John Fleming Cancer Care Program. "I received all the care I needed from the best of the best for my cancer treatment. I am now four years cancer free."

Cordray is very appreciative of AccessHealth Spartanburg. "The [AccessHealth] staff has always been wonderful. They have been kind, considerate, helpful and have gone out of their way to assist me. It is a wonderful program that assists people who are unable to afford health insurance with their health needs. It cares for people and ensures that they receive the care they need." Cordray is always willing to give back to AccessHealth Spartanburg in any way possible. Her participation in client focus groups has allowed AccessHealth Spartanburg to improve its programming and understand client needs.



## **Patient Profile HOPS: Dora Henderson**

Dora Henderson lay in bed, not eating or drinking, praying to God to take her. Grief stricken over the deaths of her daughter and sister, she was faced with raising two grandchildren. Complicating matters, she had several chronic illnesses and poor dental health. For months she'd been going to a local charity organization to get her teeth pulled, two per visit, to qualify for free dentures. When her teeth were finally pulled, Henderson was told she could not get the needed dentures. Depressed, she lost the will to live.

Registered nurse Lyssa Foust had recently joined Spartanburg Regional Healthcare System as the HOP Clinical Team Leader. In Spartanburg, HOP patients are part of the larger collaborative, Access-Health Spartanburg. Foust came across the name of a client who had drifted away: Dora Henderson. Reading her profile, Foust became concerned. The patient was single, unemployed and had stopped seeing her doctor. Foust picked up the phone and called Henderson, who fortunately answered. Foust scheduled an appointment with her to determine what was happening. "Dora had been dropped by her doctor for missing appointments. As the HOP coordinator, I needed to get her back on track."

Little did Foust know how badly Henderson needed help. Her problems were complex; finding solutions on her own was overwhelming. Once Foust understood the big picture, she became Henderson's advocate. "First, I found Dora a new doctor. We went to appointments together. When she encountered a problem, we talked about it and worked through the stumbling blocks," said Foust. One of the biggest issues was the lack of dentures. When Henderson learned the agency that had promised the dentures was unable to provide them, she was devastated. No teeth meant she couldn't eat most foods and she began losing weight. She kept her mouth shut tight, mumbling rather than talking. Once again, Foust stepped in to help. Together they went back to the agency and were able to get Henderson the free dentures. Foust says that Henderson is like a new person. "I am so proud of Dora. When all you've ever heard is no, finally getting yes is transformative."

# **Community Outreach and Partnerships:**









**Community Garden** AccessHealth Spartanburg has partnered with the Hub City Farmers Market to plant a community raised-bed garden at AHS and begin a fresh food education program for our clients. Spartanburg County has several food deserts in the community, limiting our clients' access to fresh food. The community garden program focuses on educating our clients on access to fresh food and how to make the most of the Double Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) at the Farmer's Market.

**Reading Initiative** AccessHealth Spartanburg has opened a Little Free Library outside of the office. This library provides our clients, their families, and community members with access to literature and educational material. In addition to the outdoor library, community members have donated over 250 books to create libraries inside both AccessHealth lobbies and to start a children's reading nook.

**Cleveland Park Playground Build** In October, AccessHealth staff members donated four hours of their time to volunteer with the Cleveland Park playground construction project. The staff worked together with students, firefighters, EMS, city employees, non-profit groups, and many other dedicated volunteers. It was a peaceful day where community members were able to offer their support and look forward to the future.

Robert Wood Johnson Foundation's Culture of Health Prize The city of Spartanburg was one of eight cities recently awarded the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation's Culture of Health Prize for 2015. According to the city of Spartanburg's webpage, "Spartanburg County is being recognized for leveraging its unique strengths and rallying community partners around a shared vision of health. Efforts have resulted in a significant reduction in teen pregnancy rates in the county, a comprehensive neighborhood revitalization that is increasing affordable housing, education opportunities, and access to wellness services and healthy foods, increased access to healthcare and social services for low-income, uninsured residents in the county and creative strategies to integrate behavioral health services into the community." AccessHealth Spartanburg has been chosen as one of the community organizations to showcase the physical award. Thank you to our staff and partners for all the hard work you do to make our community a healthy place to live.
